RUSHVILLE HOSE COMPANY LENDS A HAND IN OWEGO



Members of the Rushville Hose Company went to Owego, R NY to provide mutual aid assistance after heavy rains from Tropical Storm Lee caused the Susquehanna River to overflow into downtown Owego. Art Rilands, Phil Catlin, and Paul Moberg (pictured left) traveled to Tioga County to assist the Owego Fire Department by providing mutual aid to the overwhelmed fire department. Tasks included helping to distribute food and supplies to flood ravaged

victims and supporting local cleanup efforts. They were joined by several other engine companies. The guys commented on the amount of debris being removed from buildings and piled at the road side for disposal that can be seen in the photo (right). The floods forced the evacuation of 10,000 people in Tioga County and another 20,000 people in Broome County. The Owego Fire Department appreciated this assistance and commended the Rushville Hose Company for pitching in during this relief effort.



Fire Gong Finds A New & Old Home



The original fire gong hung in the arch atop of the Village Hall in 1909. The gong was sounded by pulling a rope to engage a large hammer, which struck the gong, summoning Rushville firemen to the call of

duty. On December 29, 1925 a committee was formed to study the feasibility of a siren and the fire department donated \$200 towards that effort. The gong was in service until 1933 when it was replaced by the siren. The gong was removed from atop the Village Hall in 2006 and recently erected at the firehouse (Warehouse St. side). It stands proudly, symbolizing the dedication of the Rushville Fire Department, spanning over numerous generations of dedicated individuals. These days, a modern siren, electronic pagers, cell phones, and sophisticated fire alarm system communicate emergencies instantaneously to members. The Rushville Fire Department is proud of its heritage and its accomplishments, and appreciates all the support from the community and the Village Board.

Fall Fire Safety Tips from the Rushville Hose Company

As summer turns to fall, it's a good idea to refresh your memory on fall fire safety tips. Some safety tips are the same regardless of the time of year, but many safety concerns are seasonal, particularly those that involve keeping your home warm.

Time Changes Mean Battery Changes

Get in the habit of changing the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors every fall and spring when changing the clocks for Daylight Savings Time. It is also a good idea to make it standard procedure in your household to verify that all fire extinguishers are fully charged and in working order when you adjust the clocks each season.

Home Heating Tips

No matter what type of device you use to heat your home, making sure your heating devices and/or systems are in good working order is an important part of learning some fall fire safety tips. Many things can go wrong with heating equipment during the spring and summer months. Verify that everything you need to keep your home warm throughout fall and winter is in good working order before you experience the first cold snap of the season.

Fireplace Safety Tips

- Get your chimney inspected each year to make sure that it is safe and hire a chimney sweep to clean out your chimney every fall.
- Repair any cracks in fireplaces and use fireplace screens to keep sparks and fire debris inside the fireplace.
- Do not ever use gasoline to start a fire in the fireplace and make sure that combustible materials are not stored within three feet of your fireplace.
- Never leave a fire unattended.
- For natural gas fireplaces, get all connections and lines inspected before use each season.
- Outdoor fireplaces can be just as dangerous as indoor units, use safety precautions.
