An update from the code officer

There are some zoning regulations that you may not be aware of. I would like to remind you that signs require building permits and there are size regulations in each district. Signs cannot be located in the highway right-of-way and need to be behind the sidewalks with exceptions for the business district which has different regulations. Please contact me before installing signs to ensure that the regulations are followed.

Also, as the heating season approaches, please remember to test your smoke detectors. Smoke detectors should be located in each bedroom, with one in the hallway outside the bedrooms as well as one on each level of the home including the basement. A good place to mount the smoke detector is 14" away from walls, near the center of the room if possible. A CO detector outside the sleeping area is also a good idea.

Heating systems, hot water tanks and all solid fuel heating units such as pellet stoves, wood stoves, coal stoves, etc now require inspection and permits. Please contact the Code Officer for more information, he is available in the office on Tuesdays and Fridays between 3 and 4pm and by appointment.

May you have happy holidays and a safe winter!!!

3. Do not bag the leaves! All bags will be emptied and it will be the homeowner's responsibility to dispose of the bags.

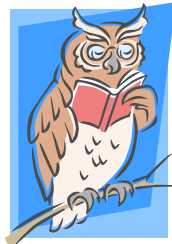

Fall Fire Safety Tips

Summer has past and fall is here bringing cooler weather and falling leaves...

- * Never park your car or truck over a pile of leaves. The heat from the vehicle's catalytic converter or exhaust system can ignite the leaves below. The resulting fire could destroy your vehicle.
- * Check all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they work, and change the batteries.
- * Service heating appliances and examine chimney flues for defects.
- * Have fireplaces and fireplace dampers checked.
- * Fireplaces should be equipped with an appropriate screen or glass enclosure to keep sparks from flying out.
- * Wood burning stoves should be examined and the flue and chimney checked for creosote buildup.
- * Burn only seasoned wood, avoid soft woods like pine, etc
- * Never use a flammable liquid to start a fireplace.
- * Never overload the hearth with wood or artificial logs, the resulting fire may be too large for the unit.
- * Put all ashes outdoors away from the house in a metal container.
- * Have a useable fire extinguisher available.
- * IT IS ILLEGAL AND DANGEROUS TO BURN LEAVES AND BRUSH

Carbon Monoxide Can Be Deadly! Your Home Needs a Carbon Monoxide Detector!

You can't see or smell Carbon Monoxide, but at high levels it can kill a person in minutes. Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced whenever any fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood, or charcoal is burned. If fuel-burning appliances are maintained and used properly, the amount of CO produced is usually not harmful. However, if appliances are not working improperly or used incorrectly, dangerous levels of CO can result. Hundreds of people die accidentally every year from CO poisoning caused by malfunctioning or improperly used fuel-burning appliances. Even more die from CO produced by idling cars. Fetuses, infants, elderly people, and people with anemia or with a history of heart or respiratory disease can be especially susceptible. Be safe. Practice the DO's and DON'Ts of carbon monoxide.

CO Poisoning Symptoms: Know the symptoms of CO poisoning. At moderate levels, you or your family can get severe headaches, become dizzy, mentally confused, nauseated, or faint. You can even die if these levels persist for a long time. Low levels can cause shortness of breath, mild nausea, and mild headaches, and may have longer term effects on your health. Since many of these symptoms are similar to those of the flu, food poisoning, or other illnesses, you may not think that CO poisoning could be the cause.

Play it Safe: If you experience symptoms that you think could be from CO poisoning:

DO GET FRESH AIR IMMEDIATELY - Open doors and windows, turn off combustion appliances and **LEAVE!**
DO GO TO AN EMERGENCY ROOM and tell the physician you suspect CO poisoning. If CO has occurred it can often be diagnosed by a blood test soon after exposure.

DO BE PREPARED TO ANSWER THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS: Do your symptoms occur only in the house? Do they disappear or decrease when you leave home and reappear when you return? Is anyone else in your household complaining of similar symptoms? Did everyone's symptoms appear about the same time? Are you using any fuel-burning appliances in the home? Has anyone inspected your appliances lately? Are you certain they are working properly?

Prevention is the Key to Avoiding Carbon Monoxide Poisoning: Follow these general guidelines:

DO have your fuel-burning appliances inspected by a trained professional at the beginning of every heating season. Make certain that the flues and chimneys are connected, in good condition, and not blocked. Fuel burning appliances include oil and gas furnaces, gas water heaters, gas ranges and ovens, gas dryers, gas or kerosene space heaters, fireplaces, and wood stoves. **DO** choose appliances that vent their fumes to the outside whenever possible, have them properly installed, and maintain them according to manufacturers' instructions. **DO** read and follow all of the instructions that accompany any fuel-burning device. **DON'T** idle the car in a garage, even if the garage door to the outside is open. Fumes can build up very quickly in the garage and living area of your home. **DON'T** use a gas oven to heat your home, even for a short time. **DON'T ever** use a charcoal grill indoors -- even in a fireplace. **DON'T** sleep in any room with an unvented gas or kerosene space heater. **DON'T** use gasoline-powered engines in enclosed spaces - mowers, snow blowers, chain saws, generators etc. **DON'T** ignore symptoms, particularly if more than one person is feeling them. You could lose consciousness and die if you do nothing.

A few words about CO Detectors—Amanda's Law:

Carbon Monoxide Detectors are widely available in stores and now installation is required. In most situations at least one alarm should be installed on each story. The law does not specify the location on each story, it just requires one on each story. Even though alarms are required -IT IS IMPORTANT to properly use and maintenance of your fuel-burning appliances. Unlike a smoke detector, where you can easily confirm the cause of the alarm, CO is invisible and odorless, so it's harder to tell if an alarm is false or a real emergency.

If your CO Detector goes off: Make sure it is your CO Detector and not your fire alarm. Check to see if any household member is experiencing CO poisoning symptoms. If they are, get them out of the house immediately and seek medical attention: Tell the doctor you suspect CO poisoning. If no one is experiencing systems, turn off all potential sources of CO such as your oil or gas furnace, gas water heater, gas range and oven, gas dryer, gas or kerosene space heater and any vehicle or small engine. Have a qualified technician inspect your fuel-burning appliances and chimneys to make sure they are operating correctly and that there is nothing blocking the fumes from being vented out of the house.
